Our staff works tirelessly to assess community needs, client needs, and sexual health trends; we regularly evaluate our programs to make sure we are delivering them effectively, efficiently, and to the people most in need. To that end, this past year, we have developed several new programs, including monthly delivery of organic produce to our clients and a free boutique where transgender or gender non-conforming individuals can find clothing they want in a non-judgmental environment. We have launched a program to provide PEP (post-exposure prophylaxis) to survivors of sexual assault and expanded our outreach programs. And we are just getting started. OUR HISTORY

When AIDS Resource was founded in 1988, our mission was relatively circumspect—to ensure residents of Lycoming County who had AIDS died comfortably and with dignity. As more effective treatments dramatically increased the life expectancy of those living with HIV, the agency's mission expanded to assist them with access to medical care, housing, food, and much more. In furtherance of the mission, the agency began providing prevention, education, testing, and outreach programs to underserved and at-risk populations. Just as we expanded our mission, we also expanded the geographic area we serve. Our efforts gradually grew to Snyder, Union, Clinton, Centre, Potter, Cameron, Clearfield, Elk, and McKean Counties.

EXPANDING OUR PROGRAMS

Advanced Care

This program focuses on aging and common medical conditions in clients aged 50 and older. We aim to enhance daily function, quality of life, health outcomes, and much more through intensive case management.



EIS and Outreach

This program engages community members in outreach activities, community events, and educational programs. It facilitates access to testing, counseling, linkage to care, referral services, and condom distribution.



Organic Produce Delivery

Organic fruits and vegetables are delivered directly to our clients each month. This program aims to help our clients maintain a well-balanced, healthy diet.

The Brian Spies Boutique

Our boutique is a safe space where transgender and gender non-conforming individuals can shop for clothes in a private, welcoming, and non-judgmental environment. All items are free!



AIDS Resource Library

Our library offers books from a variety of genres, including LGBTQ+ literature. Books are available to community members in our 10-county service area and can be picked up at our offices or mailed directly to residents.



PEP for Survivors of Sexual Assault

This program provides financial assistance to survivors of sexual assault who cannot afford PEP (post-exposure prophylaxis).

MaryBeth Tilburg Fund

In honor of the woman who supported our mission and understood the importance of personal care, this program provides free haircuts to our clients.



DME Loan Program

AIDS Resource has received various types of durable medical equipment. Clients who need DME to help them complete their daily activities may borrow equipment for short-term or everyday use.




